At the edge of the water lies a mermaid, with a starfish on her head, and her left hand looks like a crab claw.

Next to the water stands a lighthouse that looks like a giant octopus.

From the head of the octopus comes a light that moves through the room.

Hanging from the beams of the Kunsthalle is a sculpture of two swallows.

Swallows are a very popular tattoo among sailors.

Like sailors, swallows always return home after long journeys.

On September 6 and 7, there will be a concert where the Nordic folk singer Julie Hjetland will sing with a seashell.
